In Belfast and Derry~Londonderry you'll get as much art, culture, history, traditional music and good old-fashioned fun as you can handle, and it won't be long before you're planning a return trip. Only an hour apart, each city has its own unique style and character. First-time visitors to either one will be struck by how different they are to each other, yet how both manage to capture your heart. On the way between them stop off in Co. Tyrone where you'll get the chance to explore some of the darkest skies in Europe at OM Dark Sky and Observatory. And on your last day you'll be taking to the water!

If Buildings Could Talk Tour - Barney Gribben

Discover the secrets behind some of the buildings of Belfast - with a man who used to build them. Join ex-construction worker Barney on this leisurely two-hour walk. You're guaranteed to discover things about Belfast that most visitors will never be aware of. Even to people born and bred here, many of Barney's stories come as a revelation.You'll learn about the famous sites: the Crown Bar, The Royal Opera House and the Europa Hotel - all from Barney's very individual perspective. Best of all, though, are the hidden gems. The stories that only Barney, with his eagle eye for the odd, the unusual and the hidden, could spot. Fountains, water pipes, clocks - they all tell Barney their secrets. Then he passes them onto you.

The Gaol Experience - Crumlin Road Gaol

The Crumlin Road Gaol dates back to 1845 and only closed its doors as a working prison as recently as 1996. After extensive renovations the gaol has re-opened as a visitor attraction and conference centre. Today you can take a guided tour of the prison and hear about the history of the site from a time when women and children were once held within its walls, through to the political segregation of Republican and Loyalist prisoners, and learn why the decision was eventually taken to close the prison. During the tour of the gaol you'll visit the underground tunnel that once connected the gaol to the Crumlin Road Courthouse, as well as the chance to sit in the Governor's chair, see all the wings from the circle, and of course pay a visit to the condemned man's cell, before seeing the execution cell where the majority of the 17 men were hanged.

Discover Beaghmore - Embrace Tours

Enjoy a guided tour of Beaghmore Stone Circles complete with an energy walk and onsite picnic.

The seven stone circles of Beaghmore, near Cookstown, Co. Tyrone – an area of outstanding natural beauty – were re-discovered in the 1930s by a peat cutter, and an archaeological excavation followed. These ancient, intriguing and atmospheric low rocks lure you back thousands of years, deep into the past, when people marked their time by the sun, stars and planets. After your tour we visit the Shepherds Rest Pub for more storytelling and refreshments.

Stars & Stones - OM Dark Sky Park and Observatory

From the Bronze-Age Beaghmore Stone Circles at the foot of the Sperrin Mountains, to the twinkling blanket of night sky above you, the brand-new Stars and Stones experience is a unique and unforgettable opportunity to connect with land and sky, past and present, long-held facts and eternal mysteries. Boasting the darkest sky in the heart of ancient Ulster, the OM Dark Sky and Observatory lies in the centre of Northern Ireland, located at the foothills of the Sperrin Mountains. The link between Beaghmore's Neolithic observatory and the modern-day one at Davagh is full of wonder. The Interactive Visitor Centre/Observatory is the first of its kind, featuring an immersive experience based around the richness of the astronomy and the archaeological heritage of the area. The centre includes a Grab and Go Cafe, an outdoor lighting experience/digital visual show and viewing platform with AV technology. The new Solar Walk opens links Beaghmore Stone Circles with the new modern-day observatory.

Then it's time to create your own gin, using an authentic miniature copper pot still. Fill your bottle, name your gin and apply your own personalised label!

Blessingbourne is within walking distance of Fivemiletown village and close to the Fermanagh Lakelands. The estate is one of North West Ireland's most tranquil and unique destinations.

Enniskillen Taste Experience - Enniskillen Food Tours

On this gourmet tasting tour you'll sample over 20 food and drink specialities unique to County Fermanagh. Your local guide will introduce you to award-winning producers and family-run businesses who are passionate about what they do. Beginning at the iconic Enniskillen Castle, you'll explore hidden alleyways. You'll seek out the resident baker, discover the heritage of the 19th century butter market and taste locally produced artisanal gin and craft beers. Try Joe the Baker's sour dough, Pat O'Doherty's famous black bacon, Tickety Moo Ice cream, Boatyard Gin, Sharon's mouth-watering scones, Innishmacsaint beer and much more! And get to meet the local legends who can tell stories of Enniskillen like no one else! You'll finish on a high with the brilliant chef and business owner Glen Wheeler, producer of some of the finest food in Fermanagh.

Island Discovery - Erne Water Taxis

The best way to really see the Fermanagh Lakelands is from the water, and if your boat is captained by Barry Flanagan, you'll see and hear so much more – from tales of island life, to the distinctive call of a moorhen. There is no set itinerary and countless possibilities. Starting from Enniskillen, Ireland's only island town, Barry will choose your route, based on his knowledge of Lough Erne's changing currents, seasons and the movements of wildlife. As you travel, he will show you secretive creatures such as kingfishers, and intrigue you with poignant stories of the now largely uninhabited islands, from the Bronze Age to the 1980s.

For centuries, these islands were home to thriving communities making a living through farming and fishing; at the turn of the 20th century, there were around 500 residents.

Boatyard Distillery Tours - Boatyard Distillery

Discover the true spirit of Fermanagh by the shores of beautiful and majestic Lough Erne. Lough Erne owes its name to the goddess Érainn, a powerful spirit once worshipped by the local tribe. Now its shores harbour spirits of a different kind. Four varieties of gin and one vodka, in fact. They're made here on the premises. So naturally your tour will start with a gin and tonic. On your visit you'll discover how founder Joe McGirr uses traditional techniques in contemporary ways to make his Boatyard Double gin. And you'll hear how his recipe uses a native botanical that Joe's brother Brian grows on the family farm. How's that for local provenance? Your expert guide will reveal the history and origins of the boatyard distillery. You'll hear about Joe's dream of starting a distillery in his beloved Fermanagh. And you'll see how he made it happen.







Delve into the Deep - Marble Arch Caves

Explore an underworld labyrinth of caves, sinkholes and subterranean rivers deep below the green fields of Fermanagh. These are the Marble Arch Caves, a world 340 million years in the making. In the heart of the UNESCO Global Geopark, they form a natural network of rivers, waterfalls, winding passages and beautiful lofty chambers. The Guided Cave Tour takes you far into their depths. Our enthusiastic guides will lead you through aweinspiring passages and help you to understand the extraordinary geological processes at work here. The Virtual Reality Experience takes you even deeper on a journey of the imagination. Feel your senses awoken. See areas of the cave rarely viewed by human eyes. Immerse yourself in the serene ambience deep, deep underground. The secrets of the cave are waiting to be unearthed.

Florence Court

A beautiful 18th century home set on a sustainable estate and gardens. Surrounded by lush parkland and thick woodland with Benaughlin Mountain rising in the background, Florence Court enjoys a majestic countryside setting in West Fermanagh. There is something for everyone to enjoy at this extensive and welcoming place. On a guided tour of the Georgian mansion you can hear stories about the Cole family and their staff, who lived here for over 250 years. The gardens are home to the mother of all Irish yew trees, as well as the kitchen garden which is being restored to its 1930s character.

Hands-on Belleek - Belleek Pottery

On a tour of Ireland's oldest working pottery, the phrase 'look but don't touch' doesn't always apply. Each piece of Belleek Pottery passes through 16 different artisans' hands, and yours are set to become the 17th pair, as the highly skilled staff guide you through every step of their process. Arriving at the pottery on the tranquil banks of the River Erne in Co. Fermanagh, visitors are invited to ring the bell which first called people to work in 1857. Generation after generation of locals have learned a trade here, keeping heritage alive and creating Belleek's distinctive and often intricate Parian china. None more detailed than the International Centerpiece in the foyer, a true labor of love which won the Paris Exhibition in 1900. Today, around 100,000 pieces are produced every year and shipped off around the world.

Finn Lough

Come back to nature at Finn Lough, your forest refuge from all the stresses and strains of modern life. 'Finn' means fair in Irish and Finn Lough is Fermanagh's fair lake. Truly a place apart, this luxury hideaway lies deep among the ancient woodlands of Fermanagh, protected by the fair waters of the lough. It's a wonderful place to slow down, relax and rediscover the joy in the simplicity of nature. From lakeside yoga to pedal kayaks, your experiences here are curated to bring you laidback bliss. So slow down, ditch the maps and explore - because around every corner are little pockets of pleasure just waiting to be savoured.







Lough Navar Forest

Make sure your camera is charged for this one. Lough Navar View Point astounds visitors. A winding forest drive leads you to the peak of the Magho cliffs. There you get jaw-dropping views over Lower Lough Erne, Donegal Bay, and the Blue Stack and Sperrin Mountains. Simply breathtaking.

Castle Coole

Now for a taste of the finer things in life. Castle Coole serves up acres of 18th century grandeur. You'll get a guided tour of this stunning stately home and one of the most beautiful neo-classical country houses in Ireland. Built by the Earl of Benmore in 1789, it's now yours to explore inside and out, with plenty of walking trails winding through manicured parkland.

Crom Castle

Lying on the beautiful shores of tranquil Upper Lough Erne, amongst an archipelago of wooded islands and woodlands, Crom Castle is a romantic nineteenth century Victorian castle set in a 1900 acre estate, one of Northern Ireland's most important conservation areas. You get two castles for the price of one at this magnificent estate: a handsome 19th century neo-Tudor mansion and the original plantation ruins. The outstanding beauty and tranquillity of this setting with its wonderful wildlife and nature makes it a perfect retreat for all. The estate is meticulously kept and looked after by the National Trust, making it a wonderful place to discover and explore. Enjoy long woodland walks or hire a rowing boat to get up close with the wonderfully picturesque Gad Island. Crom Castle is privately owned by the Crichton family, Earls of Erne. The west wing radiates a warm and welcoming atmosphere, where guests can feel that they are staying in someone's home rather than an impersonal hotel or guest house.

Catch & Sea - Causeway Coast Foodie Tours

The early morning skies at Portrush Harbour are a rich and inky blue as you climb aboard a fishing boat bound for the Atlantic Ocean. The sight of the sun rising as you set off along the rugged waters of the Causeway Coastal Route is nothing short of breath-taking. Bold orange and yellow brushstrokes light up the sky. Those bracing sea winds are sure to wake you up no matter how early a start. En route to catch your breakfast, you'll spot some of the wildlife that inhabit the area: seals, cormorants, black rabbits, herring gulls and perhaps even a pod of dolphins – or, if you're really lucky, a minke whale.

Carrick-a-rede Rope Bridge

Carrick-a-Rede is one of Northern Ireland's most-loved attractions. It's cared for by the National Trust, a registered conservation charity founded to protect beautiful and special places for ever, for everyone.

Connected to the cliffs by a rope bridge across the Atlantic Ocean, Carricka-Rede Island (home to a single building - a fisherman's cottage) is the final destination. Suspended almost 100ft (30m) above sea level, the rope bridge was first erected by salmon fishermen 350 years ago. The bridge is high above the water and open to the elements. So crossing it is always an exhilarating experience! Thousands of people come every year to blow away the cobwebs, see beautiful coastal scenery, and spot rare wildlife. Pre-booking is essential.

Giants Causeway

Giant's Causeway, renowned for its polygonal columns of layered basalt, is the only World Heritage Site in Northern Ireland. Resulting from a volcanic eruption 60 million years ago, this is the focal point for a designated Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and has attracted visitors for centuries.

From the visitor centre, follow the tarred roadway and footpath which descends a steep slope. This will take you to 'The Stookans' - or Windy Gap, as locals call it. Here the walker is often exposed to the wild Atlantic elements. Continue along the tarred roadway and quickly the first signs of the hexagonal causeway stones will appear.

Dunluce Castle

Dunluce is one of the most picturesque and romantic of Irish Castles. With evidence of settlement from the first millennium, the present castle ruins date mainly from the 16th and 17th centuries. It was home at different times to both the feuding McQuillan and MacDonnell clans. Visitors can explore the findings of archaeological digs within the cobbled streets and stone merchants' houses of the long-abandoned Dunluce Town. The dramatic history of the place includes tales of a banshee - and of a stormy night in 1693 when the castle kitchens fell into the sea.

Digging for Bread & Gin - Bakehouse NI

Join the warm and welcoming Bakehouse cookery school for a bread- and gin-making masterclass in this charming foodie experience. On arrival, Bronagh Duffin will have refreshments ready for you to enjoy, before bringing you through the basics of bread-making, from stirring and kneading to choosing what goes into your one-of-a-kind loaf.

As your dough rises in the oven, Bronagh will lead you into the surrounding area to forage for seasonal berries, sloes, and other botanicals to make your gin come to life. Back in the Bakehouse, you'll feed gin and sugar to your little harvest in sterilised glass jars for a taste that's perfect for your palate, before tucking into your warm loaf spread with local butter and a delicious bowl of homemade soup while Bronagh makes you feel like a member of the family.

Lough Neagh Fishing Experience - Lough Neagh Tours

Experience the biggest lake in Ireland and Britain in the company of real fisherman who have lived on and fished the lough for 5 generations.

Discover some of the secrets of Lough Neagh with seventh-generation fisherman Gary on board his own passenger boat. You'll learn about the fish that live here, like the Lough Neagh Eel and the Lough Neagh Pollan... who knows, you might encounter a fishing boat on the hunt for them.

But Lough Neagh can put you in touch with your spiritual side too. Hear from Gary about the ancient pilgrimage site of Cranfield church and holy well. There's even a chance that Lough Neagh will inspire you to write a poem or two. Well, it certainly had that effect on Nobel laureate Seamus Heaney.

Using the unique water from our own stream and Irish barley we have been making whiskey here for more than four centuries. During your tour you will see the copper potstills used to distil this special spirit. The triple-distillation is at the heart of all Bushmills whiskies and creates a unique combination of smoothness and richness.

Toast the Coast NI - Toast the Coast NI

If you are delighted by the finest food and drink, your guide Portia Woods will endear the Causeway Coast to you. Her intimate knowledge of the region's food and her personal relationships with its exceptional bakers, chefs, brewers, and distillers make this coastal journey very special.

Killowen Distillery Tour and Tasting - Killowen Distillery

Discover a contemporary take on a timeless tradition in the heart of the beautiful Mourne Mountains. Inside our traditional small batch distillery, we'll explain how we make our pot still Irish whiskey and gin. Which, naturally, we'll be inviting you to taste - in an appropriately comfortable setting.

Fancy some poitin? Killowen Poitin uses a recipe from a local Mourne family that has been handed down from generation to generation. On your tour we'll also be sharing so the ingredients that go into the making of an Irish whiskey that is true to tradition: oats, wheat, unmalted & malted rye and green malt.

Their farm is located in the 'Orchard County' of Armagh, where even St Patrick is said to have planted an apple tree, in an ancient settlement east of the city.

A tour at the Armagh Cider Company begins exactly as you'd hope, with a welcome drink of apple juice or hot spiced apple, and some traditional shortbread. You will learn about everything "from blossom to bottle". The 80 acres of beautiful orchards here change season by season, from soft pink blossom in spring, to bountiful harvest in autumn, when they are carefully picked by hand (one rotten apple spoils the barrel, as they say).

Unlocking the Walled City - Visit Derry

The great walls of Derry-Londonderry, Ireland's only fully intact walled city, have witnessed centuries of drama. Today this vibrant, friendly and diverse place is full of story tellers with unforget table tales to tell.

They'll help you see the place from many perspectives. As you walk along and beside the walls your guides highlight key points and unlock stories going back hundreds of years. They talk about the important events that affected the city and changed Irish, British and European history.

You'll learn what the Plantation, the Siege, Emigration and the Troubles have meant for Derry-Londonderry's people. And everywhere you'll find that visitors are welcomed with open arms.

Journey through the life and works of this literary giant, greatly valued locally for his decency and humility, and experience the place, the people and the landscape that so inspired his work. Here, you'll see Heaney's leather school satchel and his wooden desk from Anahorish Primary School, handwritten transcripts from the poet, and books donated by the Heaney family. You'll learn about the people who were integral to his life and poetry: his family, Barney Devlin at The Forge, and countless others from the area.

Explore the Historic Hill of the O'Neill - Hill of the O'Neill

At its top there are breath-taking panoramic views from our glass observation tower. Seven of the nine counties of Ulster are clearly visible. See the drumlins of Tyrone, Lough Neagh, the Sperrin mountains, the Mournes. Imagine that, like the O'Neill, you were lord of all you survey. Then, holding that thought, join us next door in Ranfurly House where the whole story of this remarkable place is waiting to be told in our multi-media exhibition.

It's a story in which Hugh O'Neill, earl of Tyrone and the last inaugurated chief of the O'Neills, has a big part to play. A romantic figure, he was a military genius who repeatedly got the better of Queen Elizabeth's generals in Ulster. After defeat at the battle of Kinsale, however, he said goodbye to the Hill of the O'Neill and that magnificent view.

O'Neill's departure for Spain, with the earl of Tyrconnell and 90 followers, became known as the Flight of the Earls. There's no better place to find out about it than right here and our friendly guides can answer all your questions. You'll find out about what happened next too – because the old O'Neill base of Dungannon was soon to become a crucial location in the plantation of Ulster with Scottish and English settlers.

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Lunch Suggestion - Walled City Brewery

Multi award winning restaurant and craft brewery at the end of the Peace Bridge. Walled City Brewery should be on everyone's bucket list to finish off a great day spend exploring Derry~Londonderry. Located at the end of the Peace Bridge, in Ebrington Square this award-winning brewhouse and restaurant is housed in an historic military barracks. The Walled City brewery offers signature brews created on site, some inspired by the hit show Derry Girls are a firm favourite! Try a Sexy Priest, Wee English Fella or Craic Killer. From the food menu, flavours of the North West are at the forefront – from Greencastle Fish of the Day and fish croquettes to McAtamney's succulent Ribeye on the bone.





Folkways & Ritual Landscapes - Foyle Trails Bring suitable activity wear.

Fairy trees, for instance. Usually white thorns, their blossom heralds the arrival of summer.

Were celebrated at the Celtic festival of 'Bealtaine' or May Day. These trees were imbued with sacred significance and performed a central role in various rituals. Pilgrims would leave small offerings - a strip of cloth tied to a branch was a typical one - and make a wish. If you see a piece of ribbon on the tree Martin shows you, you'll know that local people are still putting their faith in it.

You'll visit sacred wells with Martin too. It was believed that drinking from them would protect you from harm and ill health. Some had the power to bestow wisdom and poetic inspiration. Such beliefs about Northern Ireland's sacred wells have survived to the present day. They are places where the veil between our world and the otherworld is at its thinnest. You will learn, in fact, that at certain times of the Celtic year, the division between the two worlds disappears...3

Martin will also tell you about bog bodies. These are human bodies which have been mummified by the habitats that they have lain in - sometimes for thousands of years. The ecology and chemistry found in Northern Ireland's peat bogs provide a perfect medium for preservation, in effect pickling human remains and other organic material for hundreds of generations.

Titanic Belfast features nine interactive galleries that explore the stories of the Titanic, as well as the city and people which made her – this whole area has been restored and developed.

CS Lewis Beyond The Wardrobe - Hidden Ulster Tours

The route you take with Lolly will vary according to time available and fitness levels - but it will usually include, among other stops, several of the ones we mention below.

Let's start with the square named for the man himself. On C.S. Lewis Square Lolly will introduce you to a series of sculptures representing characters from The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe, including Aslan, the White Witch, Mr Tumnus and the Beavers. In the adjacent park you'll also find a statue called "The Searcher". It portrays Lewis himself entering that famous portal to Narnia. As Lolly will point out, the author is also remembered in Belfast today with murals, street names and an impressive Reading Room at Queen's University. You enter it by passing through a wardrobe door!

St Mark's, Dundela, is the church in which the baby Lewis was baptised in 1899 and was to attend as a boy. In his book The Screwtape Letters he wrote about the fight between the God he would have prayed to here - and the Devil. Lolly will bring you to see the rectory next door where Lewis's grandfather used to live. Imagine you are a small boy standing in front of its door - then look up at the doorknob: it has a lion on it - you can almost feel the magic.

Sailing in the Wake of Giants - Following Seas

Travel as your ancestors once did, harnessing the power of the wind to speed across the Lough's glass-like waters, pushing the yacht to its limits – and you outside your comfort zone!

Perfect for families or as a thrilling team-building experience, by pulling together and working as a team you can help the yacht reach faster and faster speeds.

Sailing around the Lough, your guide will point out different historic points and areas of interest, like the towering cranes Samson and Goliath located at the Harland & Wolff shipyard in Belfast, or the Royal Belfast Golf Club, the oldest golf club on the island.

Being carried along by the wind like generations before you is a serene and mindful experience, not to mention sustainable – even down to the bamboo plates and bowls your lunch on-board is served in.

Once you get back on dry land, the Marina at Carrickfergus is a hive of activity, with bars, restaurants, playgrounds, even a 12th century Norman Castle, all within a short walk of each other.

Make no mistake then - this is a man who knows what he's talking about. The locations are a thrill to experience in their own right. But if you're a seasoned Thronie, each one is alive with drama and excitement: the site of a daring escape; the castle where heroes took refuge, the cave where darkness was born...A lot of them are off-the-beaten track. But with his insider knowledge, Flip knows exactly where they are. He'll make sure you can get up close and personal with every one.

Between locations you'll be travelling in Flip's van. (Worthy of a film star, Flip's van is an air-conditioned long wheel-base VW Transporter Shuttle.) It's a good time to hear his behind-the-scenes stories of life on set and in the studio during the making of Game of Thrones®. He's a mine of information on the logistics of creating the biggest TV show worldwide right here in Northern Ireland.

Flip is a local man - another key ingredient in his expertise. In fact many of the filming locations are in his own backyard. As he talks to you, you'll find his great love of the area is contagious. He'll also be delighted to pass on his knowledge of the geological processes that created the beautiful coastal landscape. So even if you don't know your Dragonstone from your Dothraki, there's plenty to discover in Flip's company.

Rathlin Island

Amid the rugged landscape of this beautiful island rich with history and wildlife let your mind wander and discover a tranquillity and beauty that is so unexpected. The ferry to Rathlin Island travels just six miles across the Sea of Moyle. This island is six miles long, one mile wide, "L" shaped and home to a slowly increasing population of around 140 people. You'll see iconic lighthouses (and one that's upsidedown) and a list of previous visitors that includes Vikings, Sir Francis Drake and Sir Richard Branson.

Hidden Huntley - Walk it off NI

Get a taste of the beautiful landscapes on Belfast's periphery and a flavour of the Lagan Valley Regional Park, with this small group, walking and artisan food experience, led by locally lived guide Nikki Elliott.

In Hidden Huntley, Nikki takes you on a trip back through time, weaving a story of food and family around the beautiful natural landscapes and forests, helping you to understand the heritage and provenance of the special, seasonal lunch that awaits you later on.

After a morning taking-in the forest air and immersing yourself in nature, you'll arrive at the Hidden Huntley Estate. There, in the 200 years old walled private garden – an oasis of peace and tranquillity - you'll enjoy a delicious, al-fresco lunch designed to showcase the organically-grown, seasonal produce from the surrounding area.

After lunch and a little time to relax, you'll be invited to explore the Hidden Huntley Estate with the owner Antonia, a great storyteller and font of local history, who'll happily recount some of the stories from her family's past. Finally, we then wind our way through beautiful parkland, back to where it all started, arriving a little richer for the experience.

Hidden Huntley gives you so much to digest, you'll wonder why you've never done it before and dream of when you can do it again.

Titanic Belfast - The Discovery Tour

First your guide will tell you a little about the Titanic Belfast building. Home to the Titanic Experience, you'll discover that every detail of this amazing edifice has a story to tell. Its architecture is full of symbols and signs. Even its roof, seen from the air, bears a message: it's in the shape of a star. This a reference to the White Star Line whose ships, like RMS Titanic, were built here on the slipways you're just about to visit.

But first you'll see the famous Harland & Wolff drawing offices. This is where Thomas Andrews worked. He was chief draughtsman and designer of RMS Titanic and the Olympic class liners. In this magnificent barrel-vaulted building, plans for these great ships were drawn-up.

On the next stop of your tour, your guide will point out a series of lamp posts. These mark the positions of the giant stanchions of the Arrol Gantry, named for its designer Sir William Arrol. Tower Bridge in London was another of his designs. But that bridge would have fitted comfortably underneath this massive construction. It provided the scaffolding which spanned the slipways where the RMS Titanic and the Olympic were built.

And now here you are, on the very spot from which RMS Titanic was launched. One of the slipways has a plan of RMS Titanic's promenade deck inlaid into it in white stone. The locations of the liner's lifeboats and funnels are marked. And if you take a seat on one of the benches, just think: these benches are positioned exactly as they would have been on RMS Titanic. On either side are oval shapes. These indicate the position of the lifeboats.

Goosebumps are regularly reported at this point. The tour is an emotional experience. You will feel something of what it was like to have worked in this shipyard. You might gain a sense of what it was like to be on board RMS Titanic on that fateful night in April 14th, 1912. That was a night to remember. This tour will stay with you for a long time too.

Killeavy Castle

Killeavy Castle is a Grade A listed historical building in County Armagh. The Castle was designed in 1836 by architect George Papworth of Dublin. Formally Killeavy Lodge, the Foxall family had their home rebuilt in the style of the pre-Victorian Gosford Castle with Towers, Tudoresque windows and a medieval style door transforming the modest farmhouse into a home fit for a king. Situated on the eastern base of Slieve Gullion, the castle and surrounding grounds brought a new element to the beautiful landscape.

Gardens Reawakened - Montalto Estate

You're now entering the stronghold of House Stark. You'll be robed in Stark regalia and handed a longbow and axe to test your battlefield skills. You'll get a tour of Winterfell, meet the Direwolves, and even uncover some of the show's special-effect secrets. It's a rare chance to immerse yourself in the world's biggest show.

In the show, Cairncastle serves as the dramatic backdrop for Ned's beheading of the Night's Watch deserter and for Sansa when she learns of her marriage to Ramsay Bolton. This windswept plateau is located above a Bronze Age promotory fort and settlement.

Door No. 9: Ballygally Castle

This beautiful old castle is home to Door No. 9. Check out the display of Steensons' Game of Thrones®-inspired jewellery.

Carnlough | Braavos Canal

Arrive at the pretty village and harbour of Carnlough and see the harbour steps where Arya crawls up to the streets of Braavos after being attacked by the Waif. The pictures que town of Carnlough is on the Causeway Coastal Route so photo opportunities abound.

Door No. 8: Mary McBride's Bar

Lunch Idea: Pub grub at Mary McBride's

Larrybane | The Stormlands & Nagga's Hill, Old Wyk

Larrybane is the spot where Renly Baratheon and his Queen Margaery Tyrell watch a tourney where her brother Ser Loras Tyrell is bested by an unknown knight, later revealed as Brienne of Tarth. Larrybane is a former chalk quarry close to Carrick-a-Rede Rope Bridge, so you absolutely must cross the exhilarating rope bridge while you're there.

Door No. 6: Fullerton Arms

Door No. 6, dominated by Daenerys most fearsome dragon, takes pride of place in this picturesque guesthouse.

Ballintoy | Lordsport Harbour and Pyke

Follow a narrow twisting road to discover this quaint fishing harbour. Ballintoy beach and harbour were used for several scenes including Theon's return to Lordsport harbour to his family home and his baptism as well as Euron's drowning and rebirth. Scenic Ballintoy is now synonymous with Pyke and the Iron Islands.







Door No. 7: Dark Hedges Estate

Visit door no. 7 at the Dark Hedges Estate, a short distance from the Dark Hedges, also known as the Kingsroad.

The Dark Hedges | The Kingsroad

Simply iconic. Fans can't come to Northern Ireland without visiting The Kingsroad. Here's your chance to walk down the haunting avenue of beech trees, which was Arya and Gendry's escape route from King's Landing. Known locally as the Dark Hedges, you'll find the intertwining trees and everchanging light create a special atmosphere.

Portstewart Strand | Coast of Dorne

Visit this spectacular two-mile stretch of beach at Portstewart to walk the coast of Dorne and climb the sand dunes where Jaime Lannister and Ser Bronn are attacked by Dornish soldiers, and where the 'Sand Snakes' discuss their plan to start a war against the Lannisters.

Lunch Idea: On location at Harry's Shack

Downhill Beach | Dragonstone

Located along the spectacular Causeway Coastal Route, Downhill Beach is part of an 11km stretch of sand and surf. Here Stannis Baratheon rejects the Seven Gods of Westeros and allows Melisandre to burn their effigies as an offering to the Lord of Light. Look out for Mussenden Temple perched dramatically on the cliff top.

Binevenagh | Dothraki Grasslands

This distinctive headland has dramatic cliffs and stunning views across Lough Foyle to Donegal. It can be easily viewed as you travel along the Causeway Coastal Route. Here the Dothraki horde surround Daenerys after her escape from the Meereen fighting pits on the back of Drogon and again when Dario and Jorah discover Daenerys' ring while searching for her.

Door No. 5: Owens

Apart from the addition of Door No. 5 featuring the Night King, this traditional pub has remained virtually unchanged since 1852.

Toome Canal | Old Valyrian Canal

Toome Canal is easily reached from the small village of Toome, located where the River Bann flows from Lough Neagh to the Atlantic Ocean. As Jorah and Tyrion sail across The Summer Sea bound for Meereen they see Drogon flying overhead and at the same time are attacked by Stone Men. If time permits learn more about the history of the canal at the Lock Keeper's Cottage.



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Poors of Thrones

In 2016 a storm swept the island bringing down some of the iconic beech trees at the Dark Hedges. The wood from the fallen trees was salvaged and transformed into unique works of art in the form of 10 intricately crafted doors. Using iconic symbols and key scenes from the show, the doors work together to tell the tale of Season 6.

Door No. 1: The Cuan, Strangford

This cosy family-run guest inn and restaurant is home to Door No. 1 which reflects the opening sequence of the show.

Door No. 2: Fiddler's Green, Portaferry

Experience some excellent Guinness as you visit Door No. 2 at traditional Portaferry bar Fiddlers Green.

Door No. 3: Percy French, Newcastle

Spot the lone direwolf on Door No. 3, in this restaurant next to Murlough Bay at the foot of the magnificent Mourne Mountains.

Door No. 4: Blakes of the Hollow, Enniskillen

This Victorian pub, famous for its warm hospitality and now for Door No. 4, with its fierce House of Targaryen dragons.

Door No. 5: Owens, Limavady

Apart from the addition of Door No. 5 featuring the Night King, this traditional pub has remained virtually unchanged since 1852.

Door No. 6: Fullerton Arms, Ballintoy

Door No. 6, dominated by Daenerys most fearsome dragon, takes pride of place in this picturesque guesthouse.

Door No. 7: Dark Hedges Estate, Stranocum

Visit door No. 7 at the Dark Hedges Estate, a short distance from the Dark Hedges, also known as the Kingsroad.

Door No. 8: Mary McBride's Bar, Cushendun

See Door No. 8 at Mary McBride's. While here, try their 'Pull-a-pint experience' and homemade Irish wheaten bread.

Door No. 9: Ballygally Castle, Ballygally

This beautiful old castle is home to Door No. 9. Check out the display of Steensons' Game of Thrones®-inspired jewellery.

Door No. 10: The Dark Horse, Belfast

Step into this European-style coffee house in Belfast's Cathedral Quarter and see Door No. 10, representing key events as Season 6 draws to a close.
